


# **Incorporated 1999**

\*The west wall of the Boutique building is now clad in siding and the northwest corner was rebuilt and stones replaced. It feels right to have this building receive new life. Next door to the east, the Halfhide building has been emptied and is ready for repairs to be useable again.

\*The alley entrance door of the Corner Store has been replaced. The previous door was difficult to open due to rust. We are enjoying the ease and security of the new door. Upstairs a new door will be needed to go with the new stairs. The new door has been ordered so we hope for installation in the near future, both door and stairs.

\*to meet our 2023 budget of \$49,009 to maintain the Corner Store and programs there and to meet the financial obligations of utilities, insurance, building maintenance, taxes and a new roof.

\*to encourage community planning and support for historic preservation.

\*to engage in historic preservation work on Main Street.

\*to seek a sound fiscal basis for maintaining the Corner Store as a Rural Nutrition and Activities Center for all ages.

\*to coordinate with the Glasco Community Recreation Board, Chamber Pride, Fun Day committee, Glasco City Library and the Free University.

\*to develop Community Based Service Learning, building on the strengths of students and volunteers.

These all speak for GCF's very real role in meeting community needs in Glasco. We will continue to seek support for our efforts in the community, making wise use of resources provided by our members.
